

With thanksgiving and gratitude to God, we celebrate another milestone in the life of our Holy Cross Church. The journey to complete the iconography and finish the interior of the Church has been a long-standing desire and goal of our community. Eight years ago, Panagioti and Dimitri Christodoulou came to Holy Cross at the request of Gerontissa (Abbess) Olympiada of Holy Protection Monastery in White Haven, PA. The brothers were working on an iconography project at the monastery. After eight years of proposals, meetings with our Iconography Committee (many via zoom), and two more visits from the Christodoulou brothers, we finally reached a consensus. More meetings, a special General Assembly, approval by His Eminence Metropolitan SA-VAS, and then fund-raising. After all these challenges we were finally able to proceed with the ordering and the installation of the iconography. This September Newsletter is both a visual documentation of the transformation of our Church and an opportunity for those who have been waiting to express their support for this project a reason to do so. You will be amazed, "Come and See!"

LISTEN, O DAUGHTER...

"Listen, O daughter, and see, and incline your ear, and forget your people and your father's house and the King will desire your beauty," states the scriptural prokeimenon in the Paraclisis service. Who is the daughter, and who is the King? These words prophetically refer to Mary who would one day give herself over to the "King" as no other person. Her renunciation of all, even her people and her earthly father's house would make her the most beloved woman who ever lived. Her beauty was such that the King of glory Himself, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ would take His human flesh from her. It is for such a person that we now gather in praise, for God has done a great work in her. The laws of nature will be overturned in her body. God shows us through her what a great calling we are all to have and how much he loves his saints. Today, let us consider what we must do to possess God in this way.

Let us begin by demystifying Panagia, taking her out of the clouds and bringing her down to earth. That she is one of us must never be doubted. Her humanity is one with ours. Created from the same lump of clay as all of us, she possessed no special advantage over any of us. Life was given to her as it was to us. The same impulses and instincts that drive our humanity either toward good or evil were also fully present in her. Yes, she became the most beloved woman who ever lived, but not owing to any special endowment, privilege or birth right. God took possession of her precisely because in herself she knew that she was nothing. She, in total poverty of spirit, radically opened herself as no one else before to the love of God.

So, when Mary inclined her ear, forgetting her people and her father's house, she willingly cut herself off from her previous existence. She catapulted herself into the rarified air of the Kingdom of God. To have stood before God on her family name, on the priestly lineage of her mother and kingly Davidic ancestry of her father or on her personal merits would have made this new creation of God in her an impossibility. In the

words of Thomas Merton, "if we want to attain greatness, we must flee from it," This is what Mary did by her submission to the Lord: "Behold, the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to your word.

"Listen, O daughter, and see, and incline your ear..." She listened as no one ever did before, and she heard ineffable things. This is how God took possession of her.

This first step of renunciation placed Mary in the situation where faith is possible. She relinquished all security- family, husband, reputation, for the sake of Christ. "Blessed is she who believed," Elizabeth exclaimed to Mary. She continues, "for there will be a fulfillment of those things which were spoken to her from the Lord." Listen to the ecstatic response of Mary: "My soul magnifies the Lord. And my spirit rejoices in God my Savior. For He has regarded the lowly state of His handmaiden; for henceforth all generations will call me blessed." This was more than just a happy response to some goods news. This was a soul now alive in God, surrendered to God, and finally possessed by Him. Indeed, Mary had chosen the good portion, as the Scripture says, that would not be taken from her.

"O God, you are my God; Early will I seek you; My soul thirsts for you; My soul longs for You in a dry and thirsty land..." writes the Psalmist. This was the desire that Panagia possessed. This is what made her such a good listener. And for this she was rewarded beyond measure. Again in the words of the Psalmist, "...the sons of men will be given drink from the river of God's delights and will feast on the abundance of God's house" (Psalm 36:8). Panagia feasted on that abundance as no other person ever has.

The desert father Alonios said: "If only a person desired it for a single day from morning to night, he would be able to come to the measure of God."

Such was the attainment of Panagia. She achieved by her attentive listening that which we all hope to achieve in our lives. She is the model for all Christian striving. In Mary we find the answer to our question, "What will I be like after I die?" The hymn of her feast sums it all up so beautifully: "In

you, O Spotless Maiden, the bounds of nature are overstepped: Childbearing is virginal: Death is but a pledge of life. After giving birth, you are a maiden, after death, alive..."


Today, however, as we celebrate the feast we are not only here to admire her assumption into heaven, we are called to imitate it. The whole of creation is groaning with eager anticipation for its redemption. It wants to break off the shackles of its slavery to corruption. We are icons of God, longing for the day when we, too, will be free, and until that time we groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free (Romans 8: 19-23). Mary is only the first fruits of what we all hope for in our lives- a body, spirit and soul resurrection.

Even now the Church has been given tokens of the resurrectional glory that is to come.

In 1987, we at Holy Cross chartered a bus to visit the tearing icon of the Guiding Mother. The pilgrimage, led by Bishop Maximos, arrived at the St. Nicholas Albanian Church in hopes of seeing a miracle. Regrettably, we were informed that a priest from Canada wiped off all the fragrant tears with balls of cotton, leaving the icon of Panagia dry. While somewhat disappointed, we proceeded to chant the Paraclisis service to the Mother of God. Then, at the very moment that we began to commemorate the list of names, fragrant tears began streaming from her eyes. Our pain and need revealed a heart filled with compassion for the world. At the end of the service, as we were anointing the hundreds in attendance, a woman approached me with a photo clutched in her hand. "This is my husband," she said. "He was murdered last month." In that moment, I felt her pain.

Then I thought of Panagia, how she carries the pain of the entire world in her tender heart.

"Listen, O daughter, and see, and incline your ear, and forget your people and your father's house and the King will desire your beauty." And so it was that Mary became a great vessel of grace as the voice of God called her to become His unwedded bride. Today, let us also listen as Mary did so as to be possessed by His love. Then the King will see and desire our beauty for Himself. May it be so. Amen! ~Fr. John Chakos

We are now winding down the "dog days of summer." It seems that even in these modern times with all of our advances in climate controlled environments, we are still humbled by the weather. And in this regard, we realize we are no better than the disciples in today's Gospel reading who are being buffeted by the wind while trying to cross the sea. But as is often the case with the Scriptures, there is more to today's passage than relating the miracles of walking on water and calming the storm. For contained in these twelve verses is the very core of the Christian life experience. And so it seemed fitting to delve into that this morning.

The first part of this experience we will call "leaving God behind." In today's passage Jesus "made the disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side." The disciples found themselves separated from their Lord. Now it may at first seem to matter a great deal whether we ourselves choose to go without God, or whether we just obey when He sends us on ahead without Him, and indeed there are important differences between the two, but for the purposes of today's discourse, the end result is the same. The point is that whether out of obedience or disobedience to Him, we often find ourselves separated, outside of His presence. Even monastics that have beheld the uncreated light do not experience it constantly. And even the least mystically gifted Christian has on occasion some sense of being in the presence of God, only to subsequently lose that awareness. The key thing is that more often than not, we lose the sense that God is with us. But the wonderful thing about this passage is that this isn't always because of our imperfection and lack of focus. For just as with the disciples whom we know were close to Him, we too can find ourselves being 'sent on ahead', while God turns His attention to other matters. It's not always because we've done something wrong or are somehow inadequate. Sometimes God ordains it because He trusts us to "go before Him."

And that often brings us to the second part of this experience, which is called "facing the storm." It seems the disciples had made a lot of progress, for "the boat by this time was many furlongs distant from the land," but at some point they ran into a great deal of difficulty, being "beaten by the waves; for the wind was against them." And so it is with us. Many times and in many ways we start out well, but suddenly face challenges and difficulties in one of life's journeys. Cares and worries brought on by the world buffet us, and we find that we aren't making any progress. And we seem to think that there's something wrong with

us, that if somehow we were closer to God or stronger in our faith that we wouldn't meet with those obstacles. But that isn't always the case. Sometimes God allows it because He knows we can hold out until He comes.

That is the next part of our experience, called "the rediscovery." The odd thing is that when He finally does come, at first we often react like non-believers. Just like the disciples seeing Jesus walking on the water, we cry "It is a ghost!" We become so accustomed to the natural order of the universe that when it is overturned by the supernatural Presence, we at first don't want to think He has come. The difference is that unlike those who deny the metaphysical, as soon as we realize it is His presence, we lose our fear; in fact, once we sense Him with us again, the boldest among us, like Peter, ask to become part of the miracle ourselves. And we find that the Lord will let us try, because He really does want us to become like Him. But more often than not, we're still not ready; wee see the waves and we being to sink, not fully believing in the Divine image that lives within us. Yet for all this, the Lord's rebuke is gentle. Why do you only believe in the workings of the world? Why do you doubt? And we seem to think something is wrong with us, because we have so little faith. But that isn't always the case. Sometimes God allows it because He knows we still need to rely on Him.

Which brings us to the last part of the experience, "back on the boat." For as soon as Jesus stepped onto the boat and rejoined His disciples, the wind stopped. And so it is with us, that the winds of our personal struggles suddenly stop when we are again aware of God's presence in our lives. And in these moments we don't even stop to wonder if there's something wrong with us. We are so delighted to be in His presence again, that like the disciples, our hearts can only marvel and worship Him; saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

My brothers and sisters, our lives are filled with many of these "boat rides." We are "sent ahead", we "face a storm", we "rediscover" the Lord, and He calms the wind when He rejoins us "back on the boat." And it is equally important to realize that these experiences are not because there is something wrong with us; rather, God ordains them because He trusts us to go as far as we can, to hold out until He comes, to rely on Him when He arrives, and to worship Him when He delivers us. For at the end of each journey we grow stronger, and slowly become partakers of the Divine nature, until the end of our journeys in this life, when He will call us into His presence and then continue to grow from Glory to Glory. To Him be all Glory, now and forever. Amen.

There's something that happens in our language quite often, which we rarely think about, but which carries a lot of meaning. It has to do with the way we speak about our bodies. There is a tendency, for us to speak about our bodies as if they were machines. We don't need to to eat, we need to "fuel up." We're not sick, our body is "breaking down." We don't think about something, we "process information." With Artificial Intelligence becoming ever more prominent in our culture, the lines we draw between ourselves and machines become ever more blurred.

But as Christians, we have to recognize that this kind of thinking is a trap, for our bodies are not mere machines, but rather, our bodies cannot be understood outside of that other essential component of the human being, the soul. As Christians, we recognize that soul and body have a deep and intimate bond, and thus, true healing must extend to body and soul both. The Gospel reading we just heard tells us of Jesus healing two blind men, but before he heals them, he asks them, "Do you believe I am able to do this?" to which they respond, "Yes, Lord." He heals their physical affliction, saying "According to your faith be it done to you."

Like the blind men, we must let the light of Christ into our souls first and foremost, for healing the body alone is insufficient. It is a point illustrated as well by the great Saint Panteleimon, whom we commemorate on this day. Saint Panteleimon was born into a wealthy pagan family, and due to his affluent background, was able to study the finest medicine of his day – basically, he was going to be a doctor. However, when speaking with a Christian, he was posed a question. The Christian asked him, "My friend, of what

use are all thy acquirements in this art, since thou art ignorant of the science of salvation?"

This changed Panteleimon's life. Embracing Christ, he was given the gifts to heal both soul and body. Echoing the Gospel passage we heard, Panteleimon healed a blind man, a miracle which made his own pagan father convert. He begin healing both souls and bodies with the power of God. However, many other physicians, jealous of his success and ignorant of the true nature of soul and body, denounced him to the Emperor, for which he would eventually be martyred. Yet, he stood courageous even in the face of death, for he recognized that, while our bodies must inevitably die, the soul is the lifegiving, animating principle of our bodies, which cannot be destroyed.



My brothers and sisters, as much as the world tells us to think of ourselves as machines made of flesh and bone, we are much more than that. We are made in the image of God, and share in both material and immaterial reality. If we forget this truth, then we are truly lost, for if we neglect asking Christ to heal our souls, we will never be *holistically* healed. In other words, we will never be whole nor will we be holy. Through the intercessions of Saint Panteleimon, may we all find healing for our souls and our bodies.

We are witnessing the Heavenly Kingdom before our eyes and celebrating the mysteries together. Now that we're approaching the Holy Dormition, this feast day is another reminder that through Christ's Resurrection, we are made alive in Him. The Panagia did fall asleep in the Lord but She was taken by Her Son both Her soul and body and became alive through Him. This is the summer Pascha. Lately, we have been seeing a lot of Christian persecutions in the Middle East, wildfires in Greece, and other issues in the world. 


SUMMER CAMP - THIS IS THE WAY


This year's theme was "This is the Way" which focused on The Cross of Christ.





